Steele-Waseca's loan is for \$12.8 million to build and improve 63 miles of line. The loan includes \$1.4 million for smart grid projects.

The infrastructure loans are being provided through the USDA Rural Development's Electric Program.



Great River Energy announces load management plan due to seasonal changes

Great River Energy (GRE) has an-nounced their load control plans for fall and the upcoming winter.

Note the control times described below are not absolute as there is a ramping window for both shed and restore times-this allows for smoothing the impact of load control.

All programs are subject to control by GRE on an "as-needed" basis and control times may change in response

ing), the total estimated winter control will be 20 days or 100 hours. For members on the 4-hour Interruptible Water Heating Program (formerly Peak Shave Water Heating), the total estimated winter control will be 20 days or 80 hours.

Steele-Waseca members participating in Dual Fuel and Air Source Heat Pump will have an estimated winter control of 18 days or 108 hours.

If you have a duel fuel heating system, be sure your off-peak controls are functioning and your backup system is prepared for the heating season. It is the member's responsibility to contact an electrical contractor should the system not be functioning properly.

GRE will continue to communicate daily load control strategies through their website, www.greatriverenergy. com. Steele-Waseca members may also gain access by visiting the co-op's website, www.swce.coop, and clicking on "CONTROL TIMES."

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Cold Weather Rule Notification 216B.097 Cold Weather Rule; Cooperative or Municipal Utility 1024862

Subdivision 1. Application; notice to clines to enter into a payment agreement residential customer. (a) A municipal utility or a cooperative electric association must not disconnect and must reconnect the utility service of a residential customer during the period between October 15 and April 15 if the disconnection affects the primary heat source for the residential unit and all of the following conditions are met:

1. The household income of the customer is at or below 50 percent of the state median household income. A municipal utility or cooperative electric association utility may (i) verify income on forms it provides or (ii) obtain verification of income from the local energy assistance provider. A customer is deemed to meet the income requirements of this clause if the customer receives any form of public assistance, including energy assistance, that uses an income eligibility threshold set at or below 50 percent of the state median household income.

2. A customer enters into and makes reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household

3. A customer receives referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation, or other programs likely to reduce the customer's energy bills.

(b) A municipal utility or a cooperative electric association must, between August 15 and October 15 each year, notify all residential customers of the provisions of this section.

Subd. 2. Notice to residential customer facing disconnection. Before disconnecting service to a residential customer during the period between October 15 and April 15, a municipal utility or cooperative electric association must provide the following information to a customer:

(1) a notice of proposed disconnection;

(2) a statement explaining the customer's rights and responsibilities:

(3) a list of local energy assistance providers:

(4) forms on which to declare inability to pay; and

(5) a statement explaining available time payment plans and other opportunities to secure continued utility service.

Subd. 3. Restrictions if disconnection necessary. (a) If a residential customer must be involuntarily disconnected between October 15 and April 15 for failure to comply with the provisions of Subdivision 1, the disconnection must not occur: (1) on a Friday, unless the customer debefore a holiday:

(4) after the close of business on a day when disconnection is permitted, unless a field representative of a municipal utility or cooperative electric association who is authorized to enter into a payment agreement, accept payment, and continue service, offers a payment agreement to the customer.

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customer:

(1) has a household income below the state median household income or is receiving energy assistance and enters into an agreement with the municipal utility, cooperative electric association, or public utility under which the residential customer pays 10 percent of the customer's gross monthly income toward the customer's bill and the residential customer remains reasonably current with those payments; or

measured after the date of the orders specified in paragraph (a). Subd. 2. Annual notice to all customers; inability to pay forms. (a) A municipal utility, cooperative electric association, or public utility must notify all residential customers annually of the provisions of this section.

Further, the disconnection must not occur until at least 20 days after the notice required in Subdivision 2 has been mailed to the customer or 15 days after the notice has been personally delivered to the customer.

(b) If a customer does not respond to a disconnection notice, the customer must not be disconnected until the utility investigates whether the residential unit is actually occupied. If the unit is found to be occupied, the utility must immediately inform the occupant of the provisions of this section. If the unit is unoccupied, the utility must give seven days' written notice of the proposed disconnection to the local energy assistance provider before making a disconnection.

(c) If, prior to disconnection, a customer appeals a notice of involuntary disconnection, as provided by the utility's established appeal procedure, the utility must not disconnect until the appeal is resolved.

325E.028 Utility payment arrangements for military service personnel Subdivision 1. Restriction on disconnection; payment schedules. (b) For purposes of this subdivision, "household income" means household income

(b) A municipal utility, cooperative electric association, or public utility must provide a form to a residential customer to request the protections of this section upon the residential customer's request.

health & safety connection Sow seeds of caution to reap safe harvest

Tarvest season is one of the busi- unless there is a fire or imminent risk of Lest times of year for farmers—and among the most dangerous.

Before taking to the fields, Safe Electricity[®] and Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric urges farm workers to be aware of potential electrical hazards and take safe steps to avoid tragedy. Take note of the following tips to keep your harvest season productive and safe:

• Install ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) to help prevent electric shock in areas that are exposed to weather and may potentially become wet. GFCIs should also be on outlets where electric tools are used.

- Examine all wiring and machinery regularly. Ensure that everything is grounded and working properly.
- Always check the weather forecast and never operate machinery when there is a risk for lightning. Make sure you're accounting for adverse weather conditions, and dedicating extra space for safety.

• Before working in the field, check the height of farm machinery and note the location of overhead power lines. Plan your route to avoid them. Keep equipment far away from lines, at least 10 feet in all directions-below, above, and to the sides. Use caution with ladders, poles, and other extended machinery.

During harvest season last year, a father and son were killed when working on their family farm in Jordan. Minnesota. According to officials, the men were lifting a farm auger when strong wind resulted in contact made with an overhead power line.


If contact is made between farming equipment and overhead lines, it's almost always best to stay in the cab. Warn others to stay away, and call 9-1-1 to alert the utility and emergency services. Do not get off the equipment





