third-party solar vendors. With that ownership comes the responsibility of on-going maintenance, such as inverter replacement, as well as attaining the proper permits and passing inspections before project installation can begin.

The price of installing a rooftop solar system is the costlier of the two options, but according to a study by the Department of Energy's Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, prices for residential solar in 2015 dropped 5 percent from the previous year. In addition to producing electricity on-site, homeowners are also reducing their retail electricity purchases, and, if the system qualifies and produces more energy than is consumed, can receive a credit from their cooperative.

"Payback costs on these systems will vary by a location's solar resource. In solar hot spots like California and Arizona, homeowners would see a faster payback than those who install rooftop solar at their homes in Minnesota," Rathbun said.

Minnesota's tree-rich landscape and intermittent cloud-coverage can prove to be obstacles when determining whether rooftop solar is well-suited for a particular site. Rathbun noted that less than 25 percent of all homes are situated to be a candidate for rooftop solar after details such as roof orientation and shade from nearby trees or other buildings are taken into consideration.

Whichever option a member may choose when looking at adding more renewable energy to their electricity supply, they can be assured that they are supporting an increasingly common, environmentally-friendly choice.

Steele-Waseca is continuing to accept subscriptions from eligible members to participate in community solar or The Sunna Project, which provides a lower-priced subscription for one panel with participation in the co-op's 16-hour water heater control program. 

Going solar? You have options

With sources of renewable energy becoming increasingly affordable and accessible, consumers are finding themselves provided with more options on how they want to power their homes and businesses.

As a member of Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric, 17 percent of the energy used in your home or business is already produced by renewables, but there are options if you're looking to offset your electricity usage even more with solar energy.

The two most prevalent choices to accomplish this are through community solar, where you can purchase output from a solar panel in a shared project owned by your cooperative, or rooftop solar, which involves installing modules on your property.

Community solar

Your electric cooperative has designed a community solar garden to be an easy, cost-effective way for members to take advantage of solar energy. By purchasing the output of one or more solar panels in a project, members are contributing to a collaborative, mutually-beneficial partnership between them and their cooperative.

"The energy produced from these projects helps to power the distribution system," said Mark Rathbun, renewable energy lead at Great River Energy, Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric's

wholesale power provider for its legacy members. "While the energy created from the solar gardens doesn't directly power their homes, they receive a credit on their energy bill based on the system's output. It also gives members the assurance of working directly with their local electric cooperative."

Community solar gardens are optimally sited for production and properly sized for connection to the energy grid as well. Cost of participation varies depending upon the module's power rating and what year the project was built. Subscribers receive a credit on their bill at their co-op's current electric rate for the community solar portion of their bill for the next 20-25 years (Steele-Waseca's program is scheduled to expire in 2035). Through their subscription payments, members are contributing to the project's construction, operations and maintenance, but don't bear those costs the same as they would for their own rooftop system.

"Those costs are shared amongst subscribers and it's more efficient to perform maintenance on one large system versus sending crews to a number of different installation sites," Rathbun said.

Rooftop solar

Rooftop solar offers consumers the direct benefit of offsetting their electric consumption with an on-site system that is typically purchased through

Contact Gopher State One Call at least 48 hours before digging begins

Whether you plan to dig posts for a deck, plant a tree or trench in electric lines for an outbuilding, it is important to understand and utilize Gopher State One Call (GSOC) before starting your project.



The GSOC system is designed to notify utilities, in accordance with state law, who may have underground facilities in the area where digging is planned. That call needs to be made at least 48 hours (excluding weekends and holidays) before you plan to dig. If a homeowner hires a contractor to do the work, then by law the contractor must obtain the ticket that allows digging to proceed.

When you contact Gopher State One Call, you may call 811 or 800-252-1166. You may also visit www.gopherstateonecall.org to submit your application. Be prepared with the following information: your name, home phone number, work/cellphone number, and email address; when you plan to begin to work; how many days the digging may take; type of work you will be doing; county and city/township where the work will be done; address and nearest cross streets or township range/section where work will be done; where you will be digging on the property (also mark the area preferably with white paint); whether any digging will be done in the road right-of-way. 1023496

Since most private facilities are not listed on the GSOC, **it is the homeowner's responsibility to hire someone to**

locate their private underground facilities. Private underground facilities, or customer-owned facilities, are those facilities that were installed behind or after the meter. Also, if overhead distribution lines serve the property and the power is then distributed on the property by underground service facilities, those service facilities may be considered private. If the homeowner's electric meter is located on the property line, then that electric line from the meter to the house is considered privately owned and will not be located.

Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric does not locate buried wires that are the homeowner's responsibility. A list of private locators are available at gopherstateonecall.org. Move your cursor over the "About" tab on the home page, click on "Industry Directory," and "PRIVATE FACILITY LOCATORS."

This list is by no means an exhaustive list or a list of locators recommended by GSOC. For additional locators, consult a search engine like Google or the Yellow Pages under "Utilities Underground - Locating." Private locators will charge a fee for their services.

Other private facilities can include: natural gas farm taps, natural gas or propane gas underground piping to buildings, private water systems, data communication lines, invisible fences,

CALL 811 BEFORE YOU DIG. IT'S THE LAW.

UNDERGROUND POWER LINES can be just as dangerous as overhead power lines. Avoid serious injury and property damage by calling 811 before you dig to have underground facilities marked.

- Call Gopher State One Call at 811 at least two business days prior to a dig.
- Dial 811 or 1-800-252-1166 during normal business hours; this service is free for homeowners.
- Minnesota state law requires you to call.
- If you damage a line, you may be financially responsible for repairs.

You may also submit your dig information at gopherstateonecall.org/submit.

and many others. **N**o one should ever remove flags before work is completed for the safety of all digging in the area. If you come in contact with an underground utility, evacuate the area and notify your utility provider.
