To be eligible, the entrant must meet the following requirements:

- 2. All entries must include: a) the completed application form below; b) answers to both essay questions typed on an 8.5" x 11" sheet of paper; c) applicant's school and community information typed on a separate sheet of paper; and d) two letters of recommendation (one from an instructor, counselor or administrator, and the other from a church or community leader).
- 3. Return entries to: Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric, c/o Youth Tour

2019, PO Box 485, Owatonna, MN 55060. Entries must be received in Steele-Waseca's office on or before Friday, Feb. 22, 2019. The two Youth Tour recipients will be notified by Friday, March 22, 2019.

Each entry will be evaluated by a panel of judges for:

- completeness
- composition
- neatness
- ability to communicate
- school and community activities

Essay Questions:

- 1. Why would you like to be Steele-Waseca's delegate to Youth Tour 2019? What do you hope to gain from the experience? Answer in 150 words or less.
- 2. Write a short essay on what commitment to community means to you. Include how you contribute to your

community. Answer in 300 words or less.

School and Community Information (use a separate sheet of paper to list the following):

- All school activities include letters and honors earned, positions held, etc.
- All community activities include all church, community service and positions held.
- Work experience and any other information.

REA is requiring that each participating cooperative's delegate(s) report to the Crowne Plaza Airport located at 3 Appletree Square in Bloomington for an orientation session on Saturday, June 15, presently at 11 a.m. An afternoon flight to Washington, D.C., will follow the orientation session.

Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric sells portion of service territory to Owatonna Public Utilities

Sale involves fewer than 100 meter locations

In early spring 2019, a few small portions of the service territory currently served by Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric will be transferred to Owatonna Public Utilities (OPU).

State statute 216B.44 allows a municipal utility to extend its corporate boundaries, and purchase territory formerly served by another utility. This is the case for portions of the city of Owatonna and six small pieces of territory served by Steele-Waseca. The territory involves fewer than 100 meter locations. The statute also provides that payment be made to the selling utility based on book value and revenue over a specific period.

According to Steele-Waseca General Manager Syd Briggs, OPU first approached the co-op regarding the territory in 2015. Selling utility property involves a lot of information gathering on equipment, substations, poles, me-

ters, transformers, etc. Net book value is determined by original cost, depreciation, additions, and retirements over the years. Applicable revenue is then calculated for a period of 10 years. The process of negotiation and information gathering required just over three years.

The formal agreement was signed Dec. 18, 2018, by Briggs and OPU General Manager Roger Warehime.

The process involves changing the territory maps with approval from the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission. Members affected will be notified by a written notice from Steele-Waseca, then will receive a welcome letter from OPU. 1057425

Although there is no decision to be made by affected members, there will be a brief time before the changeover occurs; members will be provided details and contact information for additional (Territory sale to OPU continued on Page 7)

manager connection

Tany of you remember there are seven cooperative principles that have

been established for all cooperatives (not just electric co-ops) since 1844. I have spoken about these principles during Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric town hall meetings, and we talk about them frequently at the headquarters in Owatonna.

One of the principles is, "Education, Training, and Information." I learned early on there is an exchange of ideas that permeates the cooperative nation involving members, directors, and employees equally. Not only do I endeavor to pass our members, and the general public, but I have gleaned information from everyone I talk to; everyone has experience or expertise that I benefit from. Today, I would like to address a topic that I occasionally hear from some of our members knowing it will be a benefit to everyone.

We are all concerned about climate change, and your cooperative is always working to balance the desire of lowering our carbon footprint with continuing to provide reliable and consistent power. As cooperatives, Steele-Waseca and Great River Energy (GRE) make decisions on generation resources and other issues in collaboration with our members.

We are investing in clean energy opportunities available today that will lower emissions while protecting electricity reliability and member rates. We also anticipate future technology advancements will provide new ways to generate carbon-free electricity.

Terms you are probably hearing frequently are "carbon free," and "renewables;" incidentally, they are not always synonymous. Both terms are beneficial to reducing climate change; however, many utilities consider "nuclear generation" as "carbon free." At Steele-Waseca, we believe we should take reliability and the long-term effect of all resources into account, in order to make the most responsible approach to meeting the needs of our members and the environment, as we continue to evaluate our plans and evolve our portfolio.

Great River Energy, Steele-Waseca's wholesale power provider, already has a number of carbon-free generation sources that are also renewable, including wind, hydro, and solar power. Last year, GRE supplied members like Steele-Waseca with 35 percent carbon-free power including 25 percent wind and solar, and 10 percent hydro power. In addition, Great River Energy recently announced a goal of having 50 percent of its energy come from renewable resources, primarily wind, by the year 2030.

On a smaller scale, but extremely important when listening to and involving our membership, we also launched our new POWRE (Power Optimized With Renewable Energy; pronounced power) rebate program providing additional rebates and incentives to size renewables to load. We have had great responses to the new program and are pleased with the continued interest of our membership.

Another piece of information to be on information about our cooperative to aware of is the article on the front page of this issue of *Sparks* about the service territory transfer to Owatonna Public Utilities that should occur this spring.

> Steele-Waseca took time and effort to ensure the sale did not adversely affect the remaining membership. It required over three years arriving at a conclusion that was agreeable between OPU and Steele-Waseca. Any member affected by the sale will receive a written notice from Steele-Waseca before the changeover, followed by a welcome letter from OPU.

It is always a pleasure serving all our members; we will miss those that are leaving, and I am sure they will be in good hands with OPU. Steele-Waseca will maintain past balances with capital credits, and will retire (pay) the approved amounts of equity to those members.

inches away from the trunk. If you notice brown foliage this spring, wait until late spring before pruning it out. Even though the foliage may be dead, there may be buds that are still alive to fill in the brown spots.

For more advice on selecting proper rtrees, sites, and care, contact the Steele County Soil and Water Conservation District at 507-451-6730 (ext. 3). You can also find them at www. steeleswcd.org, or on Facebook@SteeleCountySWCD. There you will find their 2019 tree order form (orders encouraged to be submitted by the end of February) loaded with hardy northern stock that is well adapted to our growing season, as well as other services they offer, including windbreak planning.

Why is my bill higher in the winter?

In our region, November through March is typically when members use the most electricity due to cold weather. Here are other factors that cause energy use to increase:

- * Shorter days and longer nights mean more time indoors. That typically means more lights, TVs, appliances and video games in use.
- * Heating systems run more. Even if you have a propane furnace, your electric use increases because electricity powers the blower motor in the furnace.
- * Holidays mean more guests, more hot showers, more cooking all using electricity.
- * Block heaters use between 500 to 1,500 watts depending on the vehicle. So a car using a 500-watt heater would use 150 kWh a month plugged in at 10 hours a day.
- Portable plug-in space heaters can dramatically increase your monthly bill as well. A 1,500-watt space heater used for 10 hours a day will use 450 kWh a month or \$54.45.

Correction

In the January 2019 Sparks newsletter, the map entitled, "Average Prices for Residential Electricity," listed the U.S. average as 13.5 cents per kWh (kilowatt hour). The National Rural Electric Cooperative Association issued a correction that the figure should have been 12.9 cents per kWh.

reat River Energy's (GRE's) port-Ifolio of generation resources has evolved over time, reflecting changes in the markets as well as GRE and its member-owner cooperatives' continued push to provide reliable, affordable and environmentally-friendly power.

Over the years, Great River Energy has evolved its portfolio by reducing its energy supply from fossil fuels and increasing its push into energy-efficiency and renewables.

"Today we see significant opportunities in renewable energy that will enable us to grow our business in a costeffective way," said Great River Energy Vice President and Chief Power Supply Officer Jon Brekke. "Our member cooperatives increasingly want more renewable energy in their supply and we aim to provide that."

Great River Energy has exited contracts to receive power from two coalbased power plants and has retired Stanton Station, a coal power plant that served the cooperative's membership for 50 years. For the first time in the organization's history, there is more

(Residential rebates continued from Page 1) rebate up to 100 kW.

Steele-Waseca is offering a \$50 rebate for residential HVAC electronically commutated motors (ECMs), which offer a higher efficiency rating than typical electric blowers or condenser fan motors.

Ductless ASHPs with the Energy Star label are eligible for a \$100 rebate if vour primary heat is delivered fuel, and \$200 if your primary heat is electric.

Energy Star labeled refrigerators and freezers are eligible for a \$50 rebate, only if you recycle your old unit.

Dehumidifiers with the Energy Star label are eligible for a \$25 rebate.

Residential lighting rebates in 2019 will only be for LED (light emitting diode) lightbulbs with the Energy Star label. The rebate is \$2 per bulb with a limit of five bulbs. There aren't any rebates for LED holiday lights and compact fluorescent lightbulbs (CFLs).

Steele-Waseca members who install a LED yard light fixture that is Energy Star or DLC (Design Lights Consortium) rated are eligible for a \$30 rebate; central air conditioning tune-ups conducted in 2019 are eligible for a \$25 rebate; Wi-Fi smart thermostats are generating capacity from natural gas members affordable, reliable energy in

GRE met the requirements of Minnesota's renewable energy standard eight years early by achieving 25 percent renewables for all-requirements member systems in 2018. The cooperative has now set an ambitious new goal of 50 percent renewables by 2030. The cooperative's next big renewable energy undertaking will be the Emmons-Logan wind farm, which will bring 300 megawatts of wind to southern North Dakota by 2020.

"This push to greater renewables helps us stay relevant and competitive in the energy markets of the future," Brekke said.

Electric cooperatives serve primarily suburban and rural areas—places with room to grow. Because of these changes, Minnesota's cooperatives and economic development partners can tout a growing renewable portfolio to attract businesses that value clean energy or have their own environmental goals.

"At the end of the day, we remain focused on our mission to provide our

eligible for a \$25 rebate; members purchasing an electric clothes dryer with the Energy Star label are eligible for a \$25 rebate; variable speed pool pumps with the Energy Star label are eligible for a \$100 rebate; and pool ASHPs are eligible for a \$200 rebate.

Steele-Waseca members purchasing any Energy Star labeled appliances during the year are encouraged to call Cindy Butterfield at Steele-Waseca weekdays to report their purchase. Energy Star purchases by member-owners help Steele-Waseca reach their Conservation Improvement Program (CIP) goal mandated in Minnesota's 2007 Next Generation Conservation Act. The statute sets an energy conservation goal for every gas and electric utility in the state equivalent to 1.5 percent of their annual retail energy sales.

Member-owners who complete home energy savings measures are eligible for \$0.05 per kWh (kilowatt hour) savings. Submit the "Residential HOME ENER-GY SAVINGS Rebate Request" form found at swce.coop, along with the requested documentation. The maximum rebate is \$100 for 2,000+ kWh.

Steele-Waseca is offering up to \$500 for members participating in the Chargeharmony with a sustainable environment." Brekke said.

As an upper Midwest utility, Great River Energy is situated near some of the world's premier wind resources. By siting wind farms in areas with prolific generating potential, the cooperative receives some of the most favorable prices for renewable energy in the country.

GRE's proximity to Canada presents opportunities to receive hydropower in a unique and mutually beneficial arrangement.

Great River Energy sees its highest energy demand in the summer while Manitoba Hydro's system peaks in the winter. Through a "diversity exchange," both utilities are able to get a boost from the other when they need it most. This agreement has been in place since 1995 and has expanded in recent years.

To align its renewable energy supplies with Minnesota's renewable energy statutes, Great River Energy only counts hydropower from small facilities in its voluntary renewable energy goals.

Wise program. This is a voluntary program offered by participating electric cooperatives for qualified members who own a plug-in (PEV) or plug-in hybrid (PHEV) electric vehicle.

The program allows members to charge their PEV/PHEV in their garage or carport using electricity from a specially installed 20-amp ChargeWise outlet. This ChargeWise outlet only provides energy during the off-peak hours of 11 p.m.-7 a.m. Members simply plug in the PEV in the evening and their vehicle is charged during those overnight hours at a reduced rate. They wake up to a fully-charged electric vehicle.

12 oz. pkg jumbo shells 32 oz. jar spaghetti sauce 2 eggs (slightly beaten)

2 eggs (slightly beaten) 1/2 lb. shredded mozzarella cheese 2 pkgs. chopped frozen spinach (thawed)

Keep safety in mind when using portable electric heaters

Electric space heaters can help warm a room quickly. However, they can be as dangerous as convenient if used improperly.

Safe Electricity® urges everyone in the home to understand the importance of using space heaters safely:

- Purchase only space heaters that have been safety tested and UL approved. Make sure the unit has an emergency tip-over shut-off feature and heating element guards. Read and follow the manufacturer's instructions for operation and care.
- Before using a space heater, make sure your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in good working condition.
- Make sure the heater is clean and in good condition.
- Place the heater out of high-traffic areas and on a level, hard, non-flammable floor surface—NOT on carpets, furniture, or countertops.
- Space heaters have one purpose—to provide supplemental heating. Never use them to thaw pipes, cook food, or

• Remember to keep space heaters at least three feet from combustible liquids, like fuel, spray cans, and paint, and flammable items such as draperies,

dry clothing or towels.

blankets, and sofas.

- Never allow pets or children near an electric heater. Accidental contact could cause serious shock or burns.
- Do not overload circuits. Never use extension cords or multiple plugs with a space heater and make sure not to plug the unit into the same circuit as other electric appliances. 32414
- If your space heater is plugged into a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) and it trips, don't assume there is something wrong with the GFCI. Immediately stop using the heater until a professional can check it—if not, a serious shock could occur.
- Never leave space heaters unattended. Turn off your space heater and unplug it before leaving the room or going to bed.
- Replace older space heaters with newer, safer models.

Many people also use electric blankets to keep warm during cold winter nights. Before plugging in electric blankets, check for any damage and inspect cord for frays, cracks, or cuts. Do not tuck electric blankets under the mattress and place nothing on top of the blanket while it's in use, including comforters and bedspreads. Don't allow pets to sleep on the electric blanket.

Winter injury affecting conifer trees

In the late spring and into the summer of 2018, the Soil and Water office received several phone calls about conifer or evergreen trees that had turned partially or completely brown, and appeared to be dead.

Minnesota's harsh climate can cause occasional severe damage to many trees and shrubs that are normally considered hardy in our region if conditions are right. Winter sun, wind and cold temperatures, snow and ice, salt used for deicing streets, and food shortages for wildlife can all severely injure or destroy trees and shrubs.

On April 13, 2018, the Steele County area received six inches of snow and rain, and again on April 18, another six inches of snow followed by a high-pressure system, clear skies, and a lot of sunshine. As the snow receded, residents started to notice entire trees that turned brown or had brown needles above the previous snow line.

This browning effect seen in the spring is typically the result of foliage desiccation caused by the sun and wind during our winter and early spring months. Water lost through evapotranspiration during this time is not readily replaced by the plant because the roots are in frozen soil. The common name for this damage is winter burn or winter drying.

Winter burn can also occur when needles are damaged after rapid temperature changes, particularly on the south side of trees. Rapid temperature drops can occur at sunset and sunrise, or when sunlight is suddenly blocked by other trees, hills, or buildings.

Prevention of winter burn begins with selecting trees that are hardy to your area. The next step is selecting the proper planting site. Avoid planting trees or shrubs next to buildings that can act as a reflective surface. The last step is making sure evergreens are sufficiently watered prior to the soil freeze up.

To help retain soil moisture and reduce root competition from grass, add a 3- to 4-inch thick layer of wood mulch around your evergreens. Be sure the mulch ring is slightly beyond the drip line of the tree, and keep mulch a few
