Learning as we go

Steele-Waseca and Great River Energy believe energy policies should consider potential impacts on the cost and reliability of electricity, in addition to environmental outcomes. Reliability concerns are especially important in Minnesota, where weather extremes can stress the electric grid for longer periods of time. 65700

For instance, GRE's power plants played a critical role in ensuring electric system reliability during the coldest part of the January polar vortex when there was very little wind energy available.

Electric utilities on track

According to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency's January 2019 report entitled, "Greenhouse gas emissions in Minnesota: 1990-2016," the electric utility sector is the only sector on track to achieve state goals for emissions reductions.

Annual Cogeneration Notification to Membership



Clean and competitive cooperatives due to prudent investments in renewables

C teele-Waseca Cooperative Electric's Wholesale power provider, Great River Energy (GRE), has reduced carbon dioxide emissions by 38 percent since 2005.

These reductions have been achieved voluntarily while providing economic benefits to members. They are the result reducing dependence on coal, and improving the diversity and competitiveness of GRE's resource portfolio.

Cooperative self-governance has been proven to spur renewable energy growth and reduce emissions. State renewable mandates are unnecessary and could cause unintended cost hikes to local electric bills.

Great River Energy achieved Minnesota's renewable energy standard of



of prudent investments in renewables, 25 percent renewables in 2017—eight years earlier than the state requirement. The following year, it established a voluntary goal of 50 percent renewables.

Proposals currently in the state legislature are considering new mandates for renewable energy and carbon-free electricity. Proposed legislation (HF700 and SF850) would require 55 percent of electricity to come from renewable resources by 2030, increasing to 80 percent renewables by 2035, and 100 percent carbon-free by 2050.

"A grassroots goal, such as our 50 percent renewables by 2030, provides flexibility to evolve our portfolio on a schedule and at prices that work best for our membership," said Great River Energy Vice President and Chief Power Supply Officer Jon Brekke. "We see significant opportunities for more renewable energy in our future, but we are opposed to increased mandates that would ultimately shift pricing power from rural consumers to for-profit developers."

Immediately following the adoption of Minnesota's 2007 renewable energy standard, the price GRE and other utilities paid for wind energy contracts increased.

- February temps The average high temperature for February was 20°F, while the average low was 1°F. This resulted in 1,529 Heating Degree Days (HDDs) and 0 Cooling Degree Days (CDDs). They compare to last year's average high of 23° F and average low of 3°F, which resulted in 1.451 HDDs and 0 CDDs.
- ENERGY STAR® Rebates In 2019, all ENERGY STAR refrigerators/freezers (with recycling), electric clothes dryers, dehumidifiers, central air conditioners, air and ground source heat pumps, light emitting diode (LED) bulbs purchased (limit 5) are eligible to receive rebates (may not be combined with special promotions). Rebate request forms must be submitted within 90 days of purchase. Rebate forms are available at swce.coop. 

Follow Minnesota law when planning for projects that require digging

Whether you plan to dig posts for a deck, plant a tree, or trench in electric lines for an outbuilding, it is important to understand, utilize, and comply with Gopher State One Call (GSOC) before starting your project.

The GSOC system is designed to state law, who may



have underground facilities in the area where digging is planned. That call needs to be made at least 48 hours (excluding weekends and holidays) before you plan to dig. If a homeowner hires a contractor to do the work, then by law the contractor must obtain the ticket that allows digging to proceed.

The type of information GSOC will need when you submit a ticket to locate whether by phone, or online at gopherstateonecall.org, includes your telephone number, your name (do not submit a ticket under someone else's name), mailing address, email address, alternate contact name and phone number, type of work, duration of work, if explosives are being used for excavation, tunneling and/or boring (also known as trenchless construction), right of way (note the ROW is not the same as an easement), area marked (white paint or flags), street address of work site including city/township name and county name, nearest intersecting street, and any additional marking instructions.

GSOC will not locate private facili-

ties, which means the homeowner is responsible for hiring a qualified professional to locate their private underground facilities, which comes with a cost to the homeowner. Private underground facilities are those installed behind or after the meter. Also, if overhead distribution lines serve the property and the power is distributed by underground service facilities, those facilities may be considered private. If a homeowner's electric meter is located on the property line, then the electric line from the me-

ter to the house is considered privately owned and will not be located.

Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric does not locate buried lines that are the homeowner's responsibility. The homeowner will need to hire and pay a private locator to determine the location of those buried lines. 1070464

A list of private locators are available at gopherstateonecall.org. Move your cursor over the "ABOUT US" tab on the home page, click on "Industry Directory," and "PRIVATE FACILITY LOCATORS." This list is by no means an exhaustive list or a list of locators recommended by GSOC. For additional locators, consult a search engine like Google or the Yellow Pages under "Utilities Underground - Locating." Remember, private locators will charge a fee for their services.

Examples of other private facilities include: natural gas farm taps, natural gas or propane gas underground piping to buildings, private water systems, data communication lines, and invisible

NTo one should ever remove flags before work is completed for the safety of all digging in the area. If you come in contact with an underground utility, evacuate the area and notify your utility provider.
