In compliance with Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric's (SWCE's) adopted rules relating to cogeneration and small power production, SWCE is obligated to interconnect with and purchase electricity from cogenerators and small power producers, whom satisfy the conditions as a qualifying facility. SWCE is obligated to provide information free of charge to all interested members upon request regarding rates and interconnection requirements. All interconnections require an application and approval to become a qualifying facility. Any dispute over interconnections, sales, and purchases are subject to resolution by the SWCE Board. 



Hartle retires after nearly 28 years with Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric

T ine Foreman Nordean Hartle retired Wednesday, March 4, after 27-plus years at Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric, a career he had aspirations for since his teenage years.

"When I was a

teenager, my older brother was an agricultural instructor in Glencoe, MN.' wrote Nordean. "He had a display board that he used in his classroom to demonstrate how electricity works. I knew then my future would be in the electrical field. While in high school, I spent three summer[s] employed by the Owatonna Public Utilities [OPU] in the gas and electric departments. After graduation, I attended Albert Lea Vocational Technical Institute and graduated with a Construction Electrician Degree. In the spring of 1979, the line foreman at OPU called me to come and apply for a job with the electrical line crew." Nordean was with OPU until Steele-Waseca called him in 1992 and asked if he would consider a position with the

Nordean officially started at Steele-Waseca on June 4, 1992. "I enjoyed working at both utility companies," reflected Nordean, "as the requirements of the job were essentially the same. It was my responsibility to build and maintain lines that supplied electricity to our members. While working at Owatonna Public Utilities, we had the luxury of being in a city setting close to our customers. At SWCE, jobs take longer due to the distance traveled in the rural community. We would stay longer to complete the project, versus going back the next day." 136854

When asked of his memorable Steele-Waseca experiences, Nordean recalled the many storms that left damage to the co-op's lines and members without power. "It was with great satisfaction knowing our team of linemen were always working together to restore power as quickly as possible," stated Nordean. "I must admit, I was able to experience many sunrises and sunsets while working long hours to get the electricity back on. While out during a storm, the element of nature is all around you, lightning, thunder, wind, rain, snow making

the job more challenging."

Nordean also recalled a particular outage call a few years ago, "While heading back into Steele-Waseca late one night after being called out, we were having difficulty seeing the roads during a blizzard and zero visibility. We encountered a car that was stopped in the middle of the road. The young woman in the car was unsure of her location, due to the whiteout conditions. We told her to follow us into Owatonna, where she spent the night." It prompted this thank you note from her:

"I was on my way from St. Cloud trying to beat the storm & get back to my baby son in Rochester. Once I hit Owatonna I could barely see & took a wrong turn...& was stuck on some other road that I didn't know where I was & was sitting there scared & crying. One truck passed me but 2 men from this coop stopped to check on me & let me follow them to Owatonna to get a hotel. If this card ever gets to those men I am so grateful that they were my angels that night! Thank you so much! Amber'

Another memorable experience for Nordean was traveling with fellow Lineman Jack Schwab to the Franklington, Louisiana area in 2005 to assist with recovery efforts following Hurricane Katrina. "I feel fortunate to live in Minnesota, as the devastation of hurricanes can cause a great deal of heartache,' wrote Nordean. "The weather in Louisiana did not work in the crews favor. The heat soaring past 90 degrees and the heat index reached over 100. The most rewarding part of our journey was bringing power back to families. The residents were so kind and thankful for our efforts. In other areas, we couldn't supply power to houses because electricians needed to complete repairs between lines and the house first.'

When asked about impactful equipment and technological advancements since he started at Steele-Waseca, Nordean responded, "All the line crew currently have iPads in their trucks. The iPads have replaced our paper map for locating members. We can get information that will tell us the size of a pole, transformer, wire size and how it is framed. As well as the phase the member is on." Adding, the software has "a

wealth of information" and is "extremely efficient."

"For many years I used a handheld crimper, now we use battery crimpers," explained Nordean. "We also have battery impact drills for tightening hardware, when framing poles, instead of using a wrench. For many years, we dug a hole, set the pole, and then shoveled the dirt back in around it, tamped it, now we put dirt on a tarp and lift it with the digger winch line to fill the hole with dirt and rock."

Nordean added the purchase of the following Kubota equipment makes their job more efficient and safer. "[The] mini excavator and skid loader are useful for construction work in wet and difficult locations that we are unable to get our big digger trucks into," stated Nordean. "We also have a Ring-O-Matic (Mudsucker) that is utilized when we need to set a new pole or replace an existing pole when gas, phone lines, or fiber cable is nearby. Before the purchase of the Mudsucker, time was spent locating the utilities digging by hand."

When asked what he will miss at Steele-Waseca, Nordean replied, "First and foremost I will miss the company of my fellow coworkers. Our goal is the same, to work safely in the elements and provide electrical service to all the members we serve. I will also miss being a part of the 'projects' building new lines, replacing and maintaining.'

As for his plans in retirement, "I will continue to enjoy my grandchildren [four in all] by attending their school and athletic events," stated Nordean. "They all like to go fishing and of course I do too." Nordean and his wife, Rhonda, have a daughter, Jenny, and son, Tony, both residing in Owatonna. "As for me, I will dust off my golf clubs and put them to good use. I have always wanted to volunteer in our community. now more than ever it will [be] feasible. I would also like to continue traveling to new destinations with my wife. I am almost certain retirement will fall into place, as I have had the good fortune of employment, family and friends all along the way."

10-15 tiger prawn shrimp or jumbo shrimp

1/2 c. cornmeal 1 egg, beaten 1 c. milk 1/4 c. sugar

4 tsp baking powder 1 1/2 c. flour


