
## **DON'T ASSUME YOU KNOW**

Protect yourself and those around you. Use GSOC this time and every time.

Whether you are a professional excavator or homeowner, in accordance with Minnesota State law, you must contact Gopher State One Call (GSOC) before starting any excavation project if you are using any machine-powered equipment of any kind, or explosives. You may be simply installing a new mail box or planting a tree, whatever the project may be, contacting GSOC before starting your project may allow you to avoid costly damages to underground facilities.



Please note: Gopher State One Call is **NOT** responsible for contacting locators to paint or flag your PRIVATE **FACILITIES.** For more information, flip over this brochure. (see below)



## THE ONE CALL PROCESS

When you have a project that requires digging, your first step is to contact Gopher State One Call. You can do this by using GSOC's Homeowner Online Locate Request system or by calling the One Call Center.

#### **BE PREPARED**

When you contact GSOC with a locate request, a series of questions will be asked.

- · What is your name, address and phone What type of work will you be doing? (i.e.
- planting a tree, installation of fence) What is the dig location's address, city,
- county and nearest intersecting street? • At the dig location, where will you be digging? (i.e. east side of house, within 5
- ft radius of white stake.) When will you be digging? (i.e. 3 days,

### GET YOUR UNDERGROUND FACILITIES MARKED

Once you have submitted your dig information it is created as a "ticket" which is sent to any utilities that may have underground facilities in the area of excavation. Those utilities will send a locator to the site to either paint or flag the area in question.

#### **CHECK FOR POSITIVE RESPONSE**

A good practice before digging is to check Gopher State One Call's Positive Response site respond to determine if each utility company

has visited your dig site or responded to your locate request. www.gsocsearch.org



In accordance with Minnesota, you must wait 48 hours (excluding weekends and holidays) after you've submitted your dig information to begin your digging project.

## THINGS TO KEEP IN MIND!

#### **OUTLINE THE DIG AREA**

Before you contact GSOC, you must outline your dig area with white markings. This helps the locator know exactly where you will be digging. Some good examples of white marking tools include white paint, flags, laths or stakes

#### WAIT FOR LOCATES

After contacting GSOC, you must wait. Utilities have 48 hours (excluding weekends and holidays) to locate their facilities. That means if you plan to dig on Saturday, call on Wednesday,



The contact information for a number of locating companies who will locate privately owned underground facilities on your property can be found in the industry directory at www.gopherstateonecall. org/homeowners, then click on "Private Utility Locators. This list is by no means an exhaustive list or a list of locators recommended by GSOC. For additional locators, consult a search engine, like Google. or refer to the Yellow Pages under "Utilities Underground - Locating." Remember, private locators will charge a fee for their services. Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric does not locate buried lines that are the homeowner's responsibility. Private underground facilities usually include any that serve outbuildings, hot tubs, security lighting, pools, and natural gas grills. Other private facilities include natural gas farm taps, private water systems, data communication lines, and invisible fences, 83970

No one should ever remove flags before work is completed for the safety of all digging in the area. If you come in contact with an underground utility, evacuate the area and notify your utility provider.

**RESPECT THE MARKS!** 

Once the utilities have been located, you'll see a variety of paint markings or flags on the ground. Respect the marks! Never use mechanized digging tools when you are digging within 24 inches of the markings. Only use hand tools.



## manager connection

Thope our newsletter I finds you safe and well. It has been an unprecedented month

with the news and actions dealing with COVID-19. As of, April 1, 2020, we have 629 cases of people who have tested positive in Minnesota, and by the time you receive this issue of *Sparks* in employees or directors testing positive yet, and we are taking many precautions with the health of all with whom we come in contact.

As the COVID-19 pandemic continues to evolve, so do our actions. In 2009, Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric developed a pandemic procedure which has since been modified. Just having one in place helped to prepare us for only the beginning of a virus that was unknown to us only a few months ago. We have implemented different aspects of each level of risk in the policy based on the current and unique situation that we find ourselves in, and will continue to evolve our actions as the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), Minnesota Governor Tim Walz, and President Donald Trump, provide us with executive orders and recommendations.

As you know, Steele-Waseca provides a critical service to our members and communities, and need everyone to do their best to ensure we remain healthy and available to provide that service. As of the close of business Tuesday, March to further minimize employee and comsignage on the door directing members to the drop box for payments as well as a phone number for communication and contact. This information is also posted on our website and social media outlets. Almost all questions/support can be handled via phone or email. All employees are instructed to keep personal interactions to a minimum, and, when necessary, should be conducted by adhering to the six-foot social distancing recommendation. This includes meet-

ings in individual offices or workspaces in addition to line work. All group meetings will be minimized and be conducted electronically when feasible. The board of directors are now meeting electronically. We have also stepped up the nightly cleaning practices and will disinfect frequently touched surfaces, i.e. door handles, light switches, bathrooms, etc.

We are concentrating on essential services to provide operation and maintenance of critical infrastructure and postponing non-essential activities. We have designated all operations employees into the two categories of Mission Critical the mail it will be much more. We are Duties – Required on-site employees, fortunate at the cooperative to have no and Mission Critical Duties – Not required on-site employees. Our crews will be working in specified groups of two to minimize risk to other personnel. Morning briefings for the crew have been moved from the crew meeting room to the vehicle bay to accommodate social distancing. Spray bottles with disinfectant have been supplied for fleet vehicles and are used after each trip.

> Although Steele-Waseca is over one month away from our normal date for the annual meeting, we are beginning to discuss possible alternatives on how or when to conduct the meeting should the current situation not be resolved. We are looking forward for the return to "business as normal" and hope to remain on schedule for June 2, 2020, with the anticipation that the restrictions on travel and meeting attendees has been rescinded. Should we need to postpone the meeting, we will announce it in the June 2020 Sparks coming with the bills in May, along with announcements on Facebook and our website. 118375

Members finding their numbers who have a load management receiver on their dual fuel, electric water heater, air conditioner, or genset will receive an additional \$7 credit. When you find your number, phone our office no later than the 7th of the month following receipt of the Sparks, or the amount will be forfeited.

## health & safety connection



Outdated wiring and overloaded circuits are the most common causes of electrical fires. Check the following areas of your home to ensure


your home's electrical safety is up to par.



Electrical outlets: Faulty electrical outlets are a leading cause of home fires. As outlets age, so do the wires behind them that you can't see. Any loose, damaged or warm-to-the-touch outlets should be repaired or replaced.



Electrical wiring: Outdated wiring is another common cause of electrical fires. Frequently tripped breakers, flickering lights and burning smells are clear warning signs. If your home is more than 20 years old, it may not be able to handle today's increased power load. If you suspect your home's wiring is outdated, leave this one to the pros and contact a qualified electrician.



Overloaded cords and outlets: Extension cords are not permanent solutions. If your big-screen TV. home theater system and other electronics are plugged into one extension cord, it's time to call an electrician and install additional outlets.



Old appliances: Older appliances are more likely to have loose or damaged wiring, which means they're more likely to catch fire. Check older appliances for damage and determine if it's time to upgrade or replace. Also check to ensure you're using appliance-grade outlets. A qualified electrician can



### Ground-fault circuit interrupters prevent electrocution

Ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) are available as circuit breakers and receptacles.

GFCIs protect against electric shock and are required in areas where water and electricity may come in contact.

Since the first introduction of GFCIs in homes there has been an:

- 83 percent drop in electrocutions.
- 95 percent drop in electrocutions caused by consumer products.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission estimates:

- 47 percent of current electrocutions could be prevented with proper GFCI protection. 1032384
- 50 percent of American homes were built before the introduction of GFCIs.
- There are potentially 43 million Amercian homes without GFCI protec-
