nator plants were blooming this past spring.

According to Great River Energy (GRE), Steele-Waseca's wholesale energy provider, bees, butterflies and other bugs pollinate more than 70% of the world's crops. GRE and other electric cooperatives are among many organizations that have focused on the plight of these pollinators, and are working to re-establish their native habitat.

Great River Energy has restored more than 200 acres of native habitat over the years. A team of employees continuously looks for ways to establish prairie and pollinator-friendly habitat along transmission lines, near substations and power plants, and on land where the cooperative has facilities. The group first collaborated on the pollinator-friendly prairie in Elk River, which was planted in 2016.

Schwab said Steele-Waseca's pollinator plot is contributing toward sustainability and protecting the environment. "This project should allow us to avoid pesticide use for the life of this habitat."

## Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric assists BioPlastic Solutions with obtaining USDA funding for business expansion

BioPlastic Solutions (BPS) in Ellendale closed Thursday, July 22, on a zero-interest loan with Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric (SWCE) to expand their business operations.

The loan closing was held at Steele-Waseca's headquarters in Owatonna. The co-op was awarded \$600,000 through the USDA (United States Department of Agriculture) Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant (REDLG) program. Steele-Waseca is

re-lending the funds to BPS for new equipment, and interior building upgrades to support increased production at their facility. With the proposed project, BPS is anticipating they will add up to 16 additional full-time positions.

# Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric pollinator project showing results of invested work

With an effort that started during fall 2019, Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric is noticing the impact of their work in establishing a pollinator plot on the west side of the co-op's property closest to the community solar installation.

The project has been led by Steele-Waseca Safety Coordinator/ Member Service Representative Jack Schwab. He worked with the Steele County Farm Service Agency to qualify the property under provisions of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

Seeding of the 1.83 acre plot was conducted in May 2020 with a combination of grasses, sedges, forbs, and legumes. After a couple of mowings, the polli-



## Co-ops grapple with parts shortages, cost increases

The COVID-19 pandemic and a spate of natural disasters have triggered a parts shortage and driven up operating costs for electric cooperatives and other utilities, and the problem could continue well into next year.

Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric Operations Division Manager Dan Meier said the co-op started the ordering process for next year in June. "This is typically done in December," said Meier. "This will impact the budget and inventory dollars. However, it is imperative that we have the necessary materials on hand." 1060300

The pandemic forced many manufacturers to reconfigure plants to accommodate social distancing, which slowed production, packaging and shipping, and delayed deliveries.

Commodity prices have also increased, with the cost of steel, copper and petroleum-based products, including plastics and composites, up at least

6% to 8% since the pandemic began.

According to logistics and distribution members of the Electric Utility Distributors Association (EUDA), transformer and conductor lead times have doubled or tripled.

Some product manufacturers have logged as many as three price increases for manufactured items during their 2021 production cycle, and EUDA members have reported price increases on certain items exceeding 300%.

Pressures on the logistics system started showing up in the Southeast and West nearly a year ago, as co-ops and contractors began rebuilding from hurricane and wildfire damage.


Unusually low interest rates have also spurred utility infrastructure investment, including expansion of electric vehicle charging networks and transmission to support renewable generation. The deployment of advance metering infrastructure components and

the phaseout of analog control and metering equipment is also up.

RESCO, which supplies co-ops and other publicly owned utilities in eight Midwestern states, has boosted inventory levels by 40% since the pandemic began.

Louisville, Kentucky-based United Utility Supply responded to multiple natural disasters during the pandemic, sending truckloads of transformers to Iowa after a derecho and to Texas following February's deep freeze. Massive supply efforts were also mounted after ice storms hit Ohio and Kentucky, and big shipments moved to co-op yards after hurricanes Sally, Laura and Delta.

Cooperation among supply and logistics cooperatives continues to help prevent pernicious shortages of essential parts and equipment. That's keeping a steady stream of hardware and components headed to co-ops across the country.

# Great River Energy member cooperatives approve sale of Coal Creek Station, HVDC transmission system

At a special Friday, July 30, meeting, Great River Energy's (GRE's) member cooperatives, including Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric, approved the sale of Coal Creek Station and the high voltage direct current (HVDC) system to Rainbow Energy Center, LLC and Nexus Line, LLC, respectively.

GRE's all-requirements members also approved a related purchase power agreement with Rainbow Energy Center, LLC. Great River Energy will purchase 1,050 megawatts (MW) of power from Rainbow for approximately two years, followed by 300 MW for approximately eight years.

Great River Energy projects the transaction could save its members approximately \$130 million compared with shutting down Coal Creek Station. Rainbow plans to operate the 1,151 MW power plant using current plant employees they hire. 1071372


Rainbow's plan to pursue carbon capture and storage at Coal Creek Station provides the possibility that many of the employees at the plant and adjacent coal mine will retain their jobs for the long term. GRE will operate and maintain the HVDC system for Nexus using existing Great River Energy transmission employees under a 10-year contract.


Rainbow Energy Center, LLC and Nexus Line, LLC are affiliates of Rainbow Energy Marketing Corporation of Bismarck, North Dakota.

GRE is building a power supply portfolio that will serve its member-owner cooperatives with clean, affordable and reliable energy for decades. The cooperative will add 900 MW of wind energy by the end of 2023 and remains on track to meet Minnesota's 80% carbon dioxide reduction goal ahead of schedule

The purchase of Coal Creek Station and the HVDC system is expected to close later this year, after additional required approvals are obtained.
