To be eligible, the entrant must meet the following requirements:

- 1. The entrant is currently a high school sophomore or junior, and their parent(s)/guardian(s) are a Steele-Waseca member. Dependents of Steele-Waseca employees or directors are not eligible to participate. 2. All entries must include: a) the completed application form below; b) answers to both essay questions typed on an 8.5" x 11" sheet of paper; c) applicant's school and community information typed on a separate sheet of paper; and d) two letters of recommendation (one from an instructor, counselor or administrator, and the other from a church or community leader).
- 3. Return entries to: Steele-Wase-

ca Cooperative Electric, c/o Youth Tour 2022, PO Box 485, Owatonna, MN 55060. Entries must be received in Steele-Waseca's office on or before Friday, Feb. 18, 2022. The two Youth Tour recipients will be notified by Friday, March 18, 2022.

Each entry will be evaluated by a panel of judges for:

- completeness
- composition
- neatness
- ability to communicate
- school and community activities

Essay Questions:

- 1. Why would you like to be Steele-Waseca's delegate to Youth Tour 2022? What do you hope to gain from the experience? Answer in 150 words or less.
- 2. Write a short essay on what commitment to community means to you. Include how you contribute to your

community. Answer in 300 words or less. 1081503

- All school activities include letters and honors earned, positions held, etc.
- All community activities include all church, community service and positions held.
- Work experience and any other information.

GRE clean energy transition brings era of rate stability

Most Great River Energy member-owner co-ops will see wholesale rates decrease in 2022

At a time when prices are rising on many products and services. Great River



vices, Great River Energy (GRE) is holding its wholesale electricity rates relatively flat into 2022 and projecting rate stability into the future.

"We spent over a decade transitioning to a portfolio of power supply and transmission resources to efficiently serve our member-owner cooperatives," said GRE President and Chief Executive Officer David Saggau. "The benefits of those decisions are now being felt. Wholesale rate stability is incredibly important to our member systems in greater Minnesota that are seeing sharp increases in other costs."

Stable wholesale rate projections are due in part to changes in the way Great River Energy produces and purchases energy. The cooperative plans to eliminate coal from its owned power supply resources, more than double its renewables and purchase a greater portion of energy from the Midwest energy market.

These changes put GRE on-track to reduce its carbon dioxide emissions by more than 80% by 2023, surpassing Minnesota statewide emissions goal more than 25 years ahead of schedule.

"We are coming off a decade of prudent investments as well as some difficult decisions that have us firmly on a path of stable rates," said GRE Vice President and Chief Financial Officer Michelle Strobel. "This is critical for our member-owners, as wholesale power costs can represent a significant percentage of their overall expenses."

Twenty of Great River Energy's 28 member-owner cooperatives will see their wholesale rates decrease slightly (GRE wholesale rates continued on Page 7)


Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric awarding scholarships in 2022 to qualified high school graduates

One scholarship will be presented at each participat-


ing school. Scholarship eligibility required by Steele-Waseca includes:

- 1. Applicants must currently be high school seniors, who will be continuing their education on a full-time basis at a two- or four-year technical school or college.
- 2. Applicants must be dependents of a Steele-Waseca member.



All eligible high school seniors should contact their guidance counselor or scholarship administrator for more information.

In 2021, Steele-Waseca awarded \$500 scholarships to 16 high school senior graduates. The co-op's scholarship program has awarded \$189,750 in scholarships since the program was established in 1954. A portion of the funds to support these scholarships come from unclaimed capital credit equity.

(GRE wholesale rates continued from Pg 1) in 2022. The other eight member-owners will see increases, primarily due to reductions in planned energy purchases from GRE.

Great River Energy is owned by and provides wholesale electricity to 28 retail distribution cooperatives serving Minnesota (including Steele-Waseca Cooperative Electric) and parts of Wisconsin. Each cooperative serves a unique membership with its own specific needs and expectations.

Stability in the face of inflation

The U.S. Labor Department has reported that expenses such as food and rent are increasing due in part to housing shortages and supply chain troubles. Consumer Price Index increases are also exceeding economists' forecasts.

"These economic challenges underscore the value of cooperatives," said GRE Vice President and Chief Corporate and Member Services Officer Mark Fagan. "Cooperatives are not-forprofit, member-owned businesses that

can adapt to changing member needs or unexpected economic trends."

GRE's budgets, rates and major business decisions are voted on by a board of democratically elected directors, all of whom are cooperative members and ratepayers.

"Our member-owners are clear about what they want from Great River Energy: affordable rates, reliable service and environmental stewardship," Fagan added.

Effect on regional economy

The benefits of price stability extend beyond cooperative members and can have a stabilizing effect on the larger economy, according to Brian Hanson, who serves as president and chief executive officer of APEX, a northern Minnesota economic development nonprofit organization.



Was your account number in Sparks?

Each month five account numbers are printed in Sparks and a total of \$35 in energy credits is divided among however many of those numbers are found. For example, if all numbers are found, a credit of \$7 will be applied to the members' following month's electric bills; or, if only one number is found, that member receives the full \$35 credit. Making a Winter Driving Survival Kit

Use an empty three-pound coffee can or any similar container with a plastic cover to store the following

- Small candles and matches
- Small, sharp knife and plastic spoons
- Red bandanna or cloth
- Pencil and paper
- Large plastic garbage bag
- Safety pins
- Whistle
- Snacks
- Cell phone adapter to plug into lighter
- Plastic flashlight and spare batteries

Reverse batteries in the flashlight to avoid accidental switching and burnout. Warm batteries before using them. Store safety items in the passenger compartment when severe winter weather threatens in case the trunk is jammed or frozen shut. Choose small packages of food that you can eat hot or cold.

Suggested food items:

- Raisins in small packets
- Semi-sweet chocolate in pieces for sharing
- Miniature candy bars
- Chewing gum
- Wrapped hard candies
- Food bars
- Canned soup, meat and poultry

Store bulky and heavy items in an accessible place:

- 30-foot cord to use as homing line when you must exit the vehicle
- Booster cables
- Sand, cat litter or other grit in a plastic milk carton
- Shovel
- Tow cables or chain
- Sleeping bag or blankets
- Road flares and reflectors
- Snowmobile suit and heavy boots


Emergency Phone Calls

If you become stranded in any part of Minnesota, and you have a cell phone, call 911 to summon help In other states, you may be able to dial 911 or 0 to reach an operator. When you talk with authorities:

- Provide information on your location, condition of all persons in the vehicle and the problem you
- Follow instructions; you may be told to stay where you are and wait for rescuers
- Do not hang up until you know who you have spoken with and what will happen next
- If you must leave your vehicle, write down your name, address, phone number and destination. Place the piece of paper inside the front windshield for someone to see
